# **Time to Change**



At OBA we understand that transition to high school can be just as much a time of worry for parents as it is for the child, and therefore with this in mind we have created this transition guide, especially for parents. This short booklet is filled with handy information and advice about your child's move from primary to secondary education and what to expect as a parent.

In this booklet you will find a list of key dates which includes details of our transition drop-in sessions.

On the dates advertised, members of our transition team will be available virtually to answer any questions you may have about your child's move to OBA. This is an ideal opportunity to ask questions, share information and find out firsthand about your child's new school.

#### What does transition to high school involve?

Over the course of the summer term, Mrs Snagg and the transition team will visit each primary school to give out welcome packs and meet with your child's Year 6 teacher to find out all the important information necessary for a smooth transition. This includes a confidential discussion that covers levels of academic achievement and details relating to your child's learning needs, personality and friendship groups, to ensure that each individual student can be placed in the most suitable form group and academic set.

For any students requiring extra support, this conversation will lead onto an additional meeting with the school SENDCO (Miss Moneypenny) or Inclusion Manager (Ms Sothern) so that a tailored care package can be organised and implemented before the start of the new school year.

All students are invited to attend two full days of induction at the academy in July. Additional visits will be offered to students who are highlighted as being particularly nervous about the move and/or those coming from primary schools where only a small number of children are transferring from. There will also be an opportunity for parents to meet/speak to their childs form tutor later in the summer term. Additionally, there is a week of Summer School in August which we encourage all our new Year 7 students to take part in!

In September, your child will take part in a welcome assembly where they will be officially inducted into the academy and will receive their house tie and planner. Parents and carers are also invited to attend this event (Covid guidelines permitting) and we will send out further information about this nearer the time.

## **School Uniform**

We are very proud of our school uniform at OBA and believe its smart appearance reflects the high standards we set for our students in terms of learning, attitude and behaviour. As part of this, we have a strict footwear policy which states that students must not wear trainers or casual boots to school. Black leather or leather-look

school shoes are compulsory.

The academy is currently undergoing a phased introduction to our new logo which has revived our 'Lucere Aude' - 'Dare to Shine' motto. Some items are quicker to change than others and therefore, whilst you will see the new logo in certain places

#### **Jewellery and Accessories**

Please note that jewellery is strictly limited to a pair of small plain stud earrings. No rings, bracelets or necklaces are to be worn. No make up, nail varnish, acrylic or gel nails to be worn. No coloured/Jewelled bows/clips. Plain dark hair bands or bobbles only. Hair colour must be natural. No extreme colours/styles will be permitted.

#### **OBA PE Kit**

- OBA branded polo shirt is compulsory for all.
- Socks are only compulsory if wearing shorts.
- A choice of shorts/leggings/ tracksuit bottoms. Any plain black leggings or tracksuit bottoms from any shop can be worn. Logo only allowed if cannot be seen - i.e. polo shirt will cover.
- OBA branded hoodie is optional. However, if a warm top is to be worn, it must be the branded hoodie.







# What you can do to help

- Ensure your child is able to attend their induction days and summer school week as these events are key in enabling students to feel more confident about starting at their new school.
- Talk through any worries your child may have about starting high school.
- Reassure your child that feeling nervous is completely normal and everyone else will be feeling exactly the same!
- Share key information about your child with OBA. The more we know about your child prior

- to them starting, the smoother their transition will be.
- Ensure that your child has all their uniform sorted before September.
- Ensure that your child knows how to get to school and has their route/travel arrangements planned in advance to avoid anxiety on the first day.
- Ensure and support good attendance. Attendance is essential to a child's academic progression but it is also significant to the transition process. If a child misses the first few days they may find

- starting their new school even more daunting as other children will have already started to settle into academy life.
- Read with your child, academic research shows that reading ability and high comprehension levels underpin all other aspects of learning. Supporting your child with their reading will undoubtedly give them a boost with their class work.

Ask OBA for help! If there is anything you are unsure about, Mrs Snagg and the rest of the transition team are here to help!

## **Hear it first hand**

"The thought of Katie starting high school absolutely terrified me and with the pandemic happening it made me feel even worse. Katie had been attending the Saturday school throughout the previous year where she got to experience lessons, meet children from other schools and meet some of the academy teachers on top of getting to know the school layout.

I feel this really helped both Katie and myself as she was becoming more confident in her new surroundings. Leading up to September the pandemic meant Katie was unable to do any transition days but teachers were in touch regularly and made videos for the children to watch so they could put faces to names. I too found this useful as I was able to see the teachers too.

Since actually starting in September things have been different for everyone but Katie has grown in confidence, met lots of new friends and she really enjoys school. I cannot thank all the teachers at OBA enough for their commitment and hard work during these strange times."

"My two children were excited to start Secondary School in September 2020, but were apprehensive about making friends, getting lost in the building and getting used to a new way of learning i.e. having different teachers for different lessons. Add on top of that the fact that we were living through a global pandemic with strict health and safety procedures in place, they were nervous to say the least. However, all of our worries and concerns (mostly about keeping them together as much as possible in lessons) were answered and dealt with by staff either by a telephone call or an email. Information was sent out to parents in good time before the summer holidays and was readily available on the school website.

The usual transition days were not able to take place but the school made short videos that, again, were available on the website. We were able to view messages from senior staff such as the Principal, as well as lovely personal video messages from the Year 7 tutors. My children's tutor even gave us a ring to say hi and introduce himself, which was nice.

During the summer holidays they were invited to attend a short summer school, which they really enjoyed. It helped them to get to know a few members of the teaching staff, meet some of the other students and refamiliarise themselves with the building and have fun, whilst learning, too!

My children took a little while to settle into school in September, which is understandable; the procedures took a week or 2 to get used to but once they got the hang of life at the academy, they have thrived. They really enjoy the lessons and, as a family, we especially like the ethos of rewarding good behaviour and good work. This really encourages my children to do their best and for their best to be acknowledged.

They have both enjoyed home learning during the current lockdown; they have had almost all live lessons with their teachers, which has been great for continuity. Staff have responded to work or computer issues quickly which has helped ease the stress of things going wrong occasionally. They have really enjoyed being able to work at their own pace.

## Attendance at OBA

The national target for all secondary school students is to achieve at least 96% within each academic year. If a student's attendance falls below this target a support package will be put into place by the attendance team to help your child raise their attendance.

#### Why does attendance matter?

All parents want their children to get on well in life. In today's work climate, it is more important than ever to have a good education behind you if you want opportunities in adult life. Children only get one chance at school, and your child's chances of a successful future may be affected by not attending school regularly.

If children do not attend school they may:

- Struggle to keep up with school work due to missing lessons
- Miss out on the social side of school life.

Poor attendance can affect children's ability to make and keep friendships.

Employers want to recruit people who are reliable. Children who have a poor school attendance record may have less chance of getting a good job.

An excellent record of attendance at school has a major impact on your child's academic progress. Research shows that there is a direct link between poor attendance and poor examination results.

#### Remember:

- Missing ½ a day a week = 90% attendance = 4 weeks missed per year.
- Missing 1 day a week = 80% attendance = more than half a term missed per year or 2 full years missed over the course of their school career.
- Missing 1½ days a week = 70% attendance = more than a quarter of the school year missed.

 An average attendance of 80% or less across a child's school career adds up to missing a whole 2 years from school.

This means that your child will miss out on a whole school year of learning during their first five crucial years in secondary education. Make every second of school count as this time cannot be recovered!

At OBA we use attendance clubs to monitor, track and reward student's attendance. This colour coded chart is in all student tutor rooms and in their weekly attendance booklets. This helps to explain to students what their current attendance is alongside what rewards and praise they can expect to receive for good attendance.

The higher the attendance, the more rewards you can expect to achieve!



# **Lucere Aude - Dare to Shine** through Courage and Choices

The culture and ethos at the academy is underpinned by our mantra of 'Lucere Aude', Dare to Shine. We expect our students to demonstrate this by showing courage and by making the choices, they need to succeed. We expect our students to choose to be punctual, to arrive to lessons on time and equipped ready to learn. The equipment they require at a minimum is a copy of their timetable, a pen, pencil, ruler and a bag. These items will be checked on a regular basis by their form tutor. Our students must be respectful to themselves, each other, their staff and our excellent facilities.

All of our students are expected to show courage by trying new things and showing resilience when they encounter a challenge.

Below are our academy's 'key expectations' that all students must follow:

- Arrive to lesson on time, with the right equipment and dressed correctly.
- Enter the classroom quietly and follow teacher's instructions.
- Respect ourselves, our staff, each other and our academy
   speak politely and raise your hand if you wish to speak in lesson.
- Try your best and work hard for the full one-hour lesson.
- Learn something new and be resilient - keep going even when the work is difficult.
- Leave quietly in single file when dismissed by your class teacher and go straight to where you should be next.

#### **Rewards**

We ensure that all of our hardworking students are praised using a variety of rewards across the school year. These are awarded on a daily, weekly and half termly basis. Examples include

- Prize draws to receive free items/treats in the academy canteen
- Reward breakfasts
- Praise phone calls home
- Vouchers and chocolates in celebration assemblies
- Theatre trips
- Summer Alton Towers trip
- Money off overseas trips such as the academy ski trip
- Year 11 have the opportunity to win discounted or free tickets to prom

#### **Sanctions**

Like all schools we do at times experience below expected behaviour where students are not adhering to our high standards.

We work by the policy of 'any antisocial activity or action that stops a teacher teaching or another student learning is not acceptable'. Within our grading system we can act on these behaviours with immediate effect. The following sanctions are set for low grades;

- A grade 3 results in a teacher sanction, this can be a set detention.
- A grade 2 is deemed an unsatisfactory lesson and will result in a compulsory 30-minute detention.
- On the very rare occasion a grade 1 is received this is a removal from lesson and

- will result in a compulsory 45-minute detention.
- We also have an internal isolation room and options of external placements available.
- We use a staged reporting system that is available to see in our behaviour policy.

#### **Uniform**

Correct uniform is an important part of a student making the correct 'choices' at OBA. Students must wear their shirts tucked in, ties full length to the bottom button on the shirt, blazers worn when inside, with black school shoes (see OBA school shoe guide). The only jewellery permitted is one plain pair of stud earrings, nails must be natural and of nude colour and make-up is not to be worn.

Students may be asked to remove make-up with wipes issued by staff.

Hair colour must also be natural and extreme colours/styles are not permitted.

We also ask students to remove outdoor coats when inside the academy.

## FAQ



#### What is the curriculum at OBA?

Our Curriculum is designed to enable our students to achieve their life goals, regardless of starting point, situation or background. We will support and challenge our students so they dare to shine, developing into courageous, resilient and respectful young adults. By following our curriculum students will be ready and fully equipped with the personal qualities, skills and knowledge for a happy and successful life full of choice and opportunity.

#### Key points include:

- A broad curriculum that allows study of a wide range of academic and vocational subjects all the way through to our Sixth Form.
- In Year 7, 8 and 9 all students will study: English, Mathematics, Science, Geography, History, Spanish, Design and Technology, PE, ICT, Art, Music, Drama, RE and "Lessons for Life" – our bespoke programme of lessons delivering essential knowledge of personal health, finance and social values.
- Regular assessment and subsequent feedback to allow rapid and sustained progress.
- Empowering knowledge has been carefully sequenced to be delivered in high quality lessons delivered by subject specialists.
- Excellent careers guidance at all stages to allow students to make informed decision as they personalise their curriculum in Year 10 and 11.

- Rich programme of extracurricular activities, clubs and trips.
- Active promotion of healthy lifestyles, British Values and wellbeing through our core 'Lessons for Life programme' and Physical Education lessons.

#### What are 'Lessons for Life?

Lessons for Life is the name given to the timetabled PSHE provision at Ormiston Bolingbroke Academy. The Lessons for Life programme provides essential learning for the personal development of our students, enabling them to become informed, active and engaged members of their community.

They will be equipped to keep themselves safe and healthy with an awareness of both themselves and the needs of others.

#### The themes we explore include:

- Being a good citizen
- Careers education
- Financial literacy
- Mental health, emotional wellbeing
- Physical Health

# How does the academy deal with any issues of bullying?

OBA operates a zero-tolerance policy on bullying and any such issues are treated seriously and investigated accordingly. Students create and sign an anti-bullying pledge in Year 7 and regularly take part in bullying awareness activities throughout their time at school to highlight the different forms and effects of bullying. This emphasis is reflected throughout the lessons for Life Curriculum but the 'Being a Good Citizen' strand has a direct anti-bullying focus. Students are encouraged to talk to their Form Tutors, Heads of Year and Class Teachers at any time about anything concerning them.

The academy takes concerns of bullying very seriously. Complaints will be thoroughly investigated, parents will be invited into school to meet with key members of staff and sanctions will be actioned accordingly. The academy utilizes formal bullying documents and the most serious form of sanction for bullying would be exclusion from school. We have very clear policies and procedures which can all be viewed on our academy website.

# My child has a Special Educational Need/Disability (SEND) What do I need to do to ensure he/she receives support?

Any students with SEND will already be identified to us from our liaison with Year 6 teachers. This allows us to plan ahead for any support that may be needed, including gathering information from outside agencies and making provision for any other support that may be required. We have an excellent SEND team and key SEND staff. Miss Moneypenny (SENCO) and Ms Sothern (Inclusion Manger) are available to discuss any of your concerns. Please be assured that your child will receive excellent SEND support at OBA

# My child needs extra support with their work. How will this happen?

The type of support required is determined by the child's individual need. Students needs are met through high quality teaching plus targeted interventions, following the principles of access, plan, do, review. Support may be offered in class through teaching assistants, during the enrichment session at the end of the day, or via withdrawal (at specific times) to attend individual programmes of support. Through meeting with parents and students, as well as transition meetings with primary schools, information is gathered to form a SEND Support Plan. This will allow us to agree targets and provide staff with information on how to adapt lessons and differentiate accordingly.

# What happens if my child is off school for any reason? What must I do as a parent/carer?

Parents/carers have a legal responsibility to ensure that their children attend school regularly and

arrive on time. If your child is going to be absent you must contact the school by 8:30am on the first day and all subsequent days of absence on 01928 711643. You can also use our electronic absence slip at: www.tinyurl.com/OBAabsence. Failure to inform the academy of any absence will result in us having to contact you via telephone or a home visit.

If your child's attendance is below 96% or for prolonged periods of absence you will be required to submit medical evidence to ensure all absences are authorised. Medical evidence can include:

- Appointment card
- Copy of a prescription/medication label
- Letter from a doctor or another medical professional

You are also required to send a letter to your child's Form Tutor on their return to school explaining the reason for their absence.

#### **Medical Appointments**

We ask that parents/carers arrange medical appointments outside of school hours wherever possible. However, we are aware that for emergency, specialist or hospital appointments this may not be possible. Please ensure your child brings a copy of their appointment card/letter to school so that their absence can be authorised as a medical appointment.

#### **Holidays in Term Time**

The academy does not condone students taking holidays in school time because of the impact it has on learning, progress and ultimately examination performance. The academy will, therefore, not authorise a holiday in term time except in the most extreme and very exceptional circumstances. In such circumstances, a written application must be made to the Principal at least one month prior to the expected date of the holiday. An appropriate response will then be sent to you in writing. Parents/carers MUST take holidays in the 13 weeks of the academy holidays or they may receive a Penalty Notice.

# How much money will my child need for food each day?

The cost of a meal deal at lunchtime is £2.50. This includes a hot meal, a small cake or biscuit and a drink. Outside of a meal deal, all meals, desserts and drinks are priced differently. Approximately £3.00-£3.50 per day will be sufficient for a snack at break time and a meal at lunchtime.

# What happens at break and lunch time?

Students in Year 7 and 8 have a different break time to the rest of the school. The split break time is highly advantageous as it means fewer queues in the dining hall. There is a large selection of food available at both break and lunch and students can also bring in their own snacks. Please note that fizzy drinks and sweets are not allowed and will be confiscated by staff!

Students have use of the dining room and yard at break time.
Students can also use the astro-turf and access the library, music lessons and lunch club during the lunch period.

#### What is a cashless system?

OBA's school canteen a biometrics system which means that your child uses their fingerprint to pay. The benefit of this is that you do not have to worry about your child carrying money around and potentially losing it. Parents and carers can add money on to their child's account via the School Gateway. If your child is entitled to a Free School Meal (FSM) then £2.50 will be added automatically to their account at lunch time.

FSM money does not cover breakfast/break time snacks but additional money can be added by parents and carers for these periods.
