A-Level Biology

Have you ever wondered why you look similar to your brother/sister? Do you understand how the medicines you take affect your body? Do clones really exist? Studying A-Level Biology will answer all your questions and encourage you to question the world around you!

Biology is the fascinating, practical study of life that will allow you to explore the complexity of living organisms from the anatomical structure of the kidney, liver and the brain to the advances in genetic engineering, control of disease and the biochemistry behind biological molecules. This highly practical course will allow you to build on your GCSE studies of both science and mathematics to further develop your investigative, analytical and evaluative skills and solve problems in a range of contexts.

Assessment

Biology A-Level is a fully linear course so assessment of knowledge and understanding of the whole course takes place at the end of two years of study. There will be a total of three exams totaling six hours of examinations and a minimum series of 12 practical sessions that must be covered and evidenced in lab books to gain the practical endorsement that sits alongside the A-Level. You will have the chance to work with lots of new laboratory equipment including; water baths, colorimeters, incubators, dissection kits and field study apparatus to strengthen a range of different practical skills.


Vocational opportunities/work experience

As with all other science A-Levels, we give students a chance to work alongside professional scientists, technologists, engineers and mathematicians for 4 – 6 weeks over the summer break through the Nuffield Scheme (subject to acceptance of application).

Career/real world

Biology A-Level will prove essential if you are considering applying to any healthcare-based university degree including; medicine, nursing, midwifery, dentistry, biomedical science, microbiology, forensic science, veterinary science, physiotherapy or even the police force. It can also complement sports science, psychology, sociology and many more!

Biology A-Level can open up a range of career opportunities from biological research, medical, environmental, forensics, sports and science communication. But the problem-solving skills you gain along the way will also be transferable to other areas such as law.



A-Level Chemistry

Have you ever questioned why ice is a solid, yet can still float? Or the mechanism of action behind pain killers?

Chemistry is a highly practical subject which will give you an insight into many chemical concepts. You will learn about chemistry in a range of different contexts, including the role it plays within industry and numerous aspects of everyday life. This course will challenge you to bring together your scientific and mathematical skills from GCSE level and apply them to new concepts.

Assessment

New A-Levels will be fully linear so assessment of knowledge and understanding of the whole course takes place at the end of two years of study. There will be a total of three exams and a series of 12 practical groups that must be covered and evidenced in your laboratory books to gain the practical endorsement that sits alongside the A-Level. The practical endorsement for chemistry is a teacher assessed pass/fail component and performance is reported separately to the A-Level grade.

Vocational opportunities/work experience

As with all other science A-Levels, we give students a chance to work alongside professional scientists, technologists, engineers and mathematicians for 4 – 6 weeks over the summer break through the Nuffield Scheme (subject to acceptance of application).

Career/real world

Chemistry A-Level will prove useful if progressing on to medicine, pharmaceuticals, industry work, environmental science, mathematics, dentistry, nursing, forensics, engineering and many more! Chemistry is also considered for many law applications as it shows you can cope with difficult concepts.



A-Level Drama and Theatre

LIFE IS DRAMA; it is part of our culture; our everyday lives, our homes via TV, film, or theatre, it ultimately allows us to communicate with the people around us. There is no other subject quite like it in school that has the potential to allow students to develop confidence, develop language according to different situations and through enquiry understand the way in which the world we live in works.

From past to present, locations across the globe; an experience in drama can take students far beyond the four walls of the classroom. Drama is the making and communicating of meaning involving performers and audiences of many kinds, engaging in a suspension of disbelief. It provides a medium for personal exploration, social criticism, celebration and entertainment.

The course

Drama A-Level provides the opportunity for you to explore, devise and perform different styles of theatre. You will explore a range of engaging texts practically; preparing to perform them as well writing about them. You will develop your knowledge and application of theatre practitioners as well devising your own plays and performing them.

This course is suited to a student who has a keen interest in drama and theatre and has experience of performing and studying prior to embarking on this qualification.

This new course is really exciting with a focus on performing and learning from live theatre. To be successful you need to be committed to rehearsals, ready to have loads of fun going to the theatre, be a confident performer or designer and willing to challenge yourself to learning new things.

Why study this subject?

Studying drama helps you develop key life skills that you will utilise throughout your life; empathy, self-confidence, co-operation, imagination, physical fitness, communication and increased memory.

The course will develop your confidence skills and you will gain key performance and analytical skills. You will work as a director, performer and designer throughout the A-Level and have the opportunity to create your own plays as well as performing. You will gain an insight into a variety of different styles of theatre both practically and theoretically; this will provide you with a foundation of knowledge for studying drama and theatre at degree level.

Higher education courses

You have the option to go on and study at degree level in a number of universities developing as a professional and gaining one of many jobs in the creative sector. **OR** you could study at a prestigious drama school and peruse an acting, film and media career.

Careers: The ARTS and CREATIVE sector employed over 1.71 million people in 2014... this is a huge amount of people!

Drama offers skills that employers have recognised as being crucial in a variety of job roles such as: front of house e.g. box office, ushers, runner, lighting and sound technicians and designer, script writer, arts consultant, director, game designer (fastest developing industry), set designer, TV editor, TV presenter, make-up artist, costume designer, actor, producer, cinematographer, theatre company artist, radio broadcaster and producer, drama therapist.



A-Level English Language

In studying A-Level English Language, learners will develop a deep knowledge of how the English language works and a secure understanding of the language system. Pupils will study a wide variety of texts, both written and spoken as well as texts from across different time periods to consider how language is used, how it has changed and is currently changing. Students will engage with specialised language terminology, concepts and theories and be expected to apply their knowledge in both their analysis of language and their creative writing.

Units

- Introduction to Language Levels. This means studying the different layers of language and how meaning is created. Areas of study include: lexis, semantics, grammar (including morphology), pragmatics and discourse.
- Introduction to Spoken Language. This includes studying phonetics, phonology and prosodics. You will study how conversations work and how people use sound as well as words to create meaning.
- Language and Gender. This unit examines how men and women communicate and investigates how far a person's gender impacts their language choices.
- Language and Power. This unit explores how language is used to assert power of others. Texts you will study include political speeches, official documents, advice leaflets, interview transcripts and debates.
- Language and Technology. In studying this unit, you will explore the impact of technology on language through examining platforms such as texting, email, the internet and social media.
- Language in the Media. For this topic pupils will analyse a range of media texts from newspaper and magazine articles to advertisements both in print and televised.
- Language Change. Students will study how the English language has changed over the last 400 years. They will study the history of the English language and world events that have helped to shape the language we use today.
- Child Language Acquisition. For this unit, pupils will study how children learn language from the age of 0 to 5. Students will study key child language acquisition theories and apply these theories to examples of children's language.

How is this course assessed?

- Examination 1: Exploring Language (2 hours 30 minutes) worth 40% of A-Level.
- Examination 2: Dimensions of Linguistic Variation (2 hours 30 minutes) worth 40% of A-Level.
- Coursework: Independent Language Research worth 20% of A-Level.

Career/real world

English Language A-Level will leave you with excellent analytical skills. This ability to think critically will be useful for a wide range of University courses. The study of English language could lead to careers in areas such as law, journalism, teaching, social work, advertising and marketing to name a few.



A-Level English Literature

The A-Level in English Literature qualification will build on the knowledge, understanding and skills established at GCSE, introducing learners to advanced literary studies, and requires reading of all the major literary genres of poetry, prose and drama. The A-Level qualification will further develop learners' ability to analyse, evaluate and make connections across texts. Learners will consider how writers shape meaning, the ways in which texts are interpreted by different readers and the significance of cultural and contextual influences on readers and writers.

Units

- Drama and poetry pre-1900. Texts studied for this unit:
 - 'Hamlet' by William Shakespeare.
 - 'A Doll's House' by Henrik Ibsen.
 - 'Selected Poems' by Christina Rossetti.
- Comparative and contextual study. For this unit pupils will study the dystopian genre. As well as looking at a number of extracts from this genre, pupils will study in close detail the following texts:
 - 'The Handmaid's Tale' by Margaret Atwood.
 - 'Fahrenheit 451' by Ray Bradbury.
- Literature post-1900. Pupils will study the following texts with the central theme of 'war':
 - 'War Horse' by Nick Stafford.
 - 'Birdsong' by Sebastian Faulks.
 - 'Selected Poems' by Wilfred Owen.

How is the course assessed?

- Examination 1: Drama and poetry pre-1900 (2 hours 30 minutes) worth 40%.
- Examination 2: Comparative and contextual study (2 hours 30 minutes) worth 40%.
- Coursework: One piece of close analysis and one comparative essay worth 20%.

Career/real world

English Literature A-Level is viewed very favourably by universities and is a subject that will give you excellent analytical skills which will be useful for any degree course. English literature A-Level can also lead to careers in the following areas: law, journalism, advertising, teaching, writing and politics.



A-Level Fine Art

How will I be assessed?

Students are assessed at the end of the two years through an examination which accounts for 40% of the qualification and a 60% coursework unit based on a personal investigation study of the student's own choosing.

How it is assessed

Component 1: A portfolio that in total shows explicit coverage of the four assessment objectives. It must include a sustained project evidencing the journey from initial engagement to the realisation of intentions and a selection of further work undertaken during the student's course of study.

Component 2: Students respond to their chosen starting point from an externally set assignment paper relating to their subject title, evidencing coverage of all four assessment objectives. This extended creative response must explicitly evidence students' ability to draw together different areas of knowledge, skill and understanding from an initial selected starting point through to their realisation of intentions in the 15 hours of supervised time.

- 96 marks for both components.
- 60% of GCE.

Non-exam assessment (NEA) set and marked by the school/college and moderated by AQA during a visit. Moderation will normally take place in June. Students who study fine art can continue to study art at university. An example of just some of the careers within the art and design industry are artists, designers, web design, gallery curator, art educator, teacher.





A-Level Geography

A two-year course designed to develop encourage you to engage in contemporary issues that support progression to undergraduate level.

Why should I choose Geography?

We live in a world of amazing beauty, infinite complexity and rigorous challenge. Geography is the subject which opens the door to this dynamic world and prepares each one of us for the role of global citizen in the 21st century. Through studying geography, people of all ages begin to appreciate how places and landscapes are formed, how people and environments interact, what consequences arise from our everyday decisions, and what a diverse range of cultures and societies exist and interconnect. Geography is a subject which builds on young people's own experiences, helping them to formulate questions, develop their intellectual skills and find answers to issues affecting their lives. It ensures that they appreciate the complexity of attitudes and values which shape the way we use and misuse the environment. Through geography, people learn to value and care for the planet and all its inhabitants. Aspects such as geology, coastal planning, environmental studies and much more.

Career/real world

Geography is an academically robust subject, due to it spanning both the physical and social sciences. Geography is part of the academic group of English Baccalaureate GCSE subjects and the Russell Group of universities has recognised A-Level Geography as one of their preferred 'facilitating subjects' - supporting an application into a wide range of undergraduate courses. The knowledge and transferable skills that geographers gain from their degree studies are highly relevant to the workplace; levels of geography graduate unemployment are extremely low. You will find geographers working in every sector of the economy including finance, local businesses, not-for-profit organisations, significant research or as key decision makers in local and national government, highlighting the range of possibilities for geographers.



A-Level Graphic Communication

Learners explore relevant images, artifacts and resources relating to a range of graphic communication. These will form an integral part of the investigating and making process. Responses to these examples will be shown through practical and critical activities which demonstrate the candidates' understanding of different styles, genres and traditions.

What will I study?

Year 1: A-Level prep

Unit 1: Portfolio: You will be given the opportunity to explore and experiment with a range of graphic design media techniques and processes, including software training in response to several different starting points and contextual references, before focusing on an extended project.

Unit 2: Externally Set Assignment (mock): You will receive a question paper consisting of five exciting starting points. You will research and develop ideas and produce a final outcome in response to one of the five questions.

Year 2: A-Level

Unit 3: Personal Investigation: You are required to develop a response to a personal idea, issue, concern, concept or theme. The visual research, development and final outcome must be supported by an assignment of 1000-3000 words.

Unit 4: Externally Set Assignment: You will receive a question paper consisting of eight exciting starting points. You will research and develop ideas in response to one of the eight questions.

How will I be assessed?

Year 1 consists of the unit 1 portfolio which provides 50% of the overall Year 1 grade, and unit 2: 10-hour controlled assessment giving 50% of the final grade.

Year 2 consists of unit 3 which provides 50% of the overall Year 2 grade and unit 4: 15 hour controlled assessment giving 50% of the final grade. Each controlled assessment takes place in the spring term with a month long preparation time.

Career/real world

A graphic design degree expands your options to include a diverse palette of creative careers that can extend to leadership positions in highly creative organizations like advertising agencies and industrial design firms.

A-Level History

Throughout both A-Level years within history, students will build on their understanding of the past through experiencing a broad and balanced course of study. They will acquire an understanding of different identities within society and an appreciation of aspects such as social, cultural, religious and ethnic diversity.

The students study a range of historical topics and issues throughout four units, developing their ability to analyse sources, historian interpretations and evidence to evaluate judgements and concepts. The units focus upon revolution and change in society, with the coursework element of the course also focusing on revolution in Europe.

History allows the students to develop their knowledge and skills, while promoting and developing more independent learners. It is a course that gets students ready for their next steps in life; be it university or careers.

Units

Unit 1: Britain, 1625–1701: Conflict, Revolution and Settlement (worth 30%): This unit focuses on the challenges to monarchical power that influenced not only the English, but also the French and American Revolutions, by studying the relationship between king and parliament during the Stuart period.

Unit 2: Russia in Revolution, 1894–1924 (worth 20%): This unit focuses on the end of the Romanov dynasty and how the first Communist State came into being. Students will learn about challenging concepts and ideologies that eventually influenced modern world history.

Unit 3: Civil Rights and Race Relations in the USA, 1850–2009 (worth 30%): This unit focuses on the changing status of African Americans and the role of the state in amending legislation in regards to civil rights, from Lincoln to Obama.

Unit 4: Coursework – Russian Revolution (worth 20%): This is an independent study where students investigate the causes of the Russian Revolution (1917).

Career/real world

Careers: historians, authors, journalists, archaeologists, politics, teaching, law, business.

University: history, classics, ancient civilisations, archaeology, history and politics, history and philosophy, history and English.



A-Level Mathematics

The course

Mathematics is a challenging subject which stimulates our curiosity and enables us to make sense of the world. Mathematics is vitally important to the economic well-being of our society through its widespread application to science, technology, business and finance. It is one of the most highly valued subjects offered at A-Level for both universities and future employers as it demonstrates that you have enhanced your reasoning and problem solving skills. A-Level Mathematics fits well with almost any combination of subjects, particularly the sciences, business, economics, IT and computing, and offers wide progression opportunities to university or vocational careers. Those with A-Level Mathematics earn on average around 10% more than those without (around £240,000 over an average lifetime).

Paper 1 and 2: Pure Mathematics $66\frac{2}{3}\%$

- Proof: construct proofs using mathematical methods.
- Algebra and Functions: consider graphs as functions of a given variable.
- Coordinate Geometry in the (x, y) Plane: study lines and circles.
- Sequences and Series: geometric, arithmetic and periodic sequences.
- Trigonometry: extended use of the sin, cosine and tangent functions.
- Exponentials and Logarithms: graph and model real-world scenarios using exponential and logarithms.
- Differentiation: consider rates of change between two variables.
- Integration: calculate the area under curves and more.
- Numerical Methods: finding the roots of functions using iterative methods.
- Vectors: extend your knowledge of vectors into the third dimension.

Paper 3: Statistics and Mechanics $33\frac{1}{3}\%$

Section A: Statistics

- Statistical Sampling: how to take samples and remove bias.
- Data Presentation and Interpretation: histograms and data analysis.
- Probability: possible outcomes and their likelihood of occurring.
- Statistical Distributions: the binomial and normal distributions.
- Statistical Hypothesis Testing: accepting or rejecting a given hypothesis.

Section B: Mechanics

- Quantities and Units in Mechanics.
- Kinematics: the motion of objects in one or two dimensions.
- Forces and Newton's laws: the fundamental rules that govern how objects move through space.
- Moments: consider the turning effects the turning effects produced by forces.

How will I be assessed?

All assessment is done by written exam at the end of the two-year course. The examination are a combination of both pure and applied elements of the course.

Career/real world

Mathematics is the language of nature. Behind all modern marvels such as space travel, smart phones and data analysis lies complex mathematical processes. For those interested in mathematics, applied science, engineering or computer science (to name but a few!) A-Level mathematics is a must.



A-Level Philosophy and Religion

Throughout A-Level Philosophy, students will study a range of philosophy, ethics and religion. In each area students will consider arguments and debates surrounding philosophical and religious issues as well as supporting and challenging their learning through study of philosophers and scholars.

Philosophy and Religion is a highly valued subject that teaches students to engage critically with arguments and debates as well as allowing independent research and development of skills and abilities that can be transferred to a wide range of other subjects and career options.

Students are assessed at the end of the two years through three examinations which account for 100% of the qualification based on philosophical issues, ethical theories and dilemmas and a study of a world tradition.

Unit 1: Philosophy of Religion – two hours (33.3%): This unit focuses upon the ultimate questions every human civilisation has asked: Is there an afterlife? Does the Divine exist? Does evil and suffering make God redundant? Using philosophers and scholars, we analyse and evaluate the responses to these issues.

Topics include: Arguments for the Divine, Problem of evil, Experiencing the Divine, Life after Death, Atheism, Religious Language, Philosophy and Science

Unit 2: Ethics and Religion – two hours (33.3%): This unit focuses on controversial dilemmas that affect the world, such as nuclear weapons, pornography and climate change, whereby we use ethical theories to decide on the right actions in these situations.

Topics include: Ethical theories, Sexual ethics, Environmental ethics, Equality, War and Peace, Meta-ethics, Medical Ethics, Virtue Ethics and Deontology

Unit 3: Study of a World Religion – two hours (33.3%): This unit allows a deep dive into a world tradition, learning about the history, changes, beliefs and practices of Christianity and how this has impacted the 21st Century. We also consider how modernity and secularism compares to this world religion.

Topics include: Beliefs, Practices, diversity, social context, political context, historical context, relationship with science, secularism.

Career/real world

Careers: police, lawyers and judges, teaching, political diplomats, charity, business, historians, writers and journalists.

University courses: philosophy, ethics-philosophy-religion, politics, world traditions, religious studies, history and philosophy, philosophy and English.

Core Maths Level 3 Certificate in Mathematical Studies

Core Maths is a qualification designed for students who have achieved a grade 5 or above in GCSE Mathematics and choose not to study A-Level Mathematics but wish to take their valuable maths skills to a higher level. Core Maths enables learners to develop their mathematical knowledge and apply it to problems found in other Level 3 courses, further study, life and employment. Core Maths is a relatively new course but already universities and employers from different sectors have expressed support for the qualification.

Many roles in today's workplace require high levels of budget management and problem-solving skills: Core Maths will be a useful tool in equipping students with these skills. Core Maths builds on GCSE level work by considering and tackling mathematics in meaningful contexts: the content of the course includes financial applications of mathematics and further statistical ideas that can support work in a wide range of other subjects such as the Sciences, Geography, Psychology and Sociology.

The course is assessed through two examination papers and leads to a qualification which carries the same UCAS tariff points as an AS Level (40% of A-Level).



A-Level Textile Design

How will I be assessed?

- Two years course consisting of two components.
- Students are assessed at the end of the 2 years.
- 96 marks for both components.
- Non-exam assessment (NEA) set and marked by the school/college and moderated by AQA during a visit. Moderation will normally take place in June.
- Component 1 (60%) is a coursework unit based on a personal investigation and supported extended piece of writing which supports the practical work.
- Component 2 (40%) is an externally set examination by AQA where students will choose from a set of questions issued by the exam board. Their final outcome is undertaken during 15 hours of supervised time.

How it is assessed

- Students to explore through lessons, workshops and independent learning a range of textile media, processes and techniques.
- Students to explore skills, ideas and intentions through a variety of media including sketchbooks, journals, digital outlays to underpin their work.
- Students are required to work in one or more area(s) of textile design, such as:
 - fashion design
 - fashion textiles
 - costume design
 - digital textiles
 - printed and/or dyed fabric and materials
 - domestic textiles and wallpaper
 - interior design
 - constructed textiles
 - art textiles
 - installed textiles
- Students encouraged to attend galleries, exhibitions and workshops both independently and through organised trips to help further their skills and understanding.

Component 1 (60%):

- A portfolio of work where students develop work based on an idea, issue, concept or theme leading to a finished outcome or a series of related finished outcomes.
- Practical elements should make connections with some aspect of contemporary or past practice of artist(s), designer(s), photographers or craftspeople.
- Written work of no less than 1000 and no more than 3000 words which supports the practical work is required prior to course completion.

Component 2 (40%):

- An externally set assignment paper provided by AQA where students respond to their subject title, evidencing all four assessment objectives.
- Students to work independently within specified time constraints, developing a personal and meaningful response and leads to a finished outcome or a series of related finished outcomes.
- 15 hours is allocated for final outcome(s).

How will I be able to progress?

- Students who study Textile Design can continue to study as part of the art and design based subjects available at university.
- Some of the careers within the art and design industry are artists, designers, web design, fashion designer, gallery curator, art educator, teacher, fashion illustrator, clothing technologist, retail buyer.



A-Level Photography

How will I be assessed? Students are assessed at the end of the two-years through an examination which accounts for 40% of the qualification and a 60% coursework unit based on a personal investigation study of the student's own choosing.

How it is assessed

Component 1: A portfolio that in total shows explicit coverage of the four assessment objectives. It must include a sustained project evidencing the journey from initial engagement to the realisation of intentions and a selection of further work undertaken during the student's course of study.

Component 2: Students respond to their chosen starting point from an externally set assignment paper relating to their subject title, evidencing coverage of all four assessment objectives. This extended creative response must explicitly evidence students' ability to draw together different areas of knowledge, skill and understanding from an initial selected starting point through to their realisation of intentions in the 15 hours of supervised time.



A-Level Psychology

Want to find out more about what makes people 'tick' and how to support people's well-being? Then studying Psychology is for you! Psychology is the scientific study of human mind and behaviour.

This qualification offers an engaging and effective, in-depth introduction to the fascinating world of psychology. Students will learn the fundamentals of the subject and develop skills valued by higher education and employers, including critical analysis, independent thinking and research.

The two-year course consists of three exams which you will take at the end of Year 13.

Paper 1: Introductory topic in Psychology – two-hour exam worth 33⅓% of A-Level

1. Social influence: conformity, social roles, obedience, resistance to social influence, minority influence and social change.
2. Memory: multi-store model of memory, types of long-term memory, the working model of memory, forgetting, eyewitness testimony, improving eyewitness testimony accuracy.
3. Attachment: caregiver-infant interactions, stages of attachment, multiple attachments and the role of the father, animal studies, explanations of attachment, deprivation studies and how early attachment can impact later relationships.
4. Psychopathology: abnormality, phobias, depression, OCD and treatments.

Paper 2: Approaches in Psychology – two-hour exam worth 33⅓% of A-Level

1. Approaches: Learning approaches, cognitive, biological, psychodynamic, humanistic approaches.
2. Biopsychology: nervous system, neurons, endocrine system, fight or flight response, localisation of function in the brain, hemispheric lateralisation, how we study the brain, biological rhythms.
3. Research Methods: Scientific processes and techniques of data handling and analysis.

Paper 3: Issues and options in Psychology – two-hour exam worth 33⅓% of A-Level

1. Issues and debates in Psychology: Gender and culture bias, ethical issues, debates in psychology, approaches to psychological investigation.
2. Relationships: partner preference, attraction, romantic, maintenance and breakdown of romantic relationships, different types of relationships.
3. Schizophrenia: classification, explanations, therapies and treatments.
4. Forensic Psychology: offender profiling, explanations of criminal behaviour and dealing with offending.

Career/real world

These will allow you to gain valuable skills for many careers such as health care, education, politics, education, HR, marketing, police or study further to become a psychologist in your field of interest.



A-Level Sociology

Want to change your society? Get to know it!

Sociology is a systematic approach to thinking about, studying, and understanding society, human social behaviour and social groups. This qualification offers an engaging and effective introduction to sociology. Students will develop knowledge and understanding of society and sociological research. This will allow students to understand society's structures, processes and issues. Sociology is exciting, interesting and extremely relevant to students' lives.

The two-year course consists of three exams which you will take at the end of Year 13.

Paper 1: Education with Theory and Methods – two-hour exam worth 33 $\frac{1}{3}$ % of A-Level

1. Education: What factors have an impact on the educational opportunities and success of young people? Learn about the role and functions of education, educational achievement, relationships and processes within schools, educational policies.
2. Methods in Context: application of sociological research to education.
3. Theory and Methods: research theory and methodology in sociology.

Paper 2: Topics in Sociology – two-hour exam worth 33 $\frac{1}{3}$ % of A-Level course


1. Families and Households: How does family life affect society? Learn about family in society, changing patterns of the family, gender roles, childhood, demographic trends.
2. Beliefs: How do the beliefs people hold affect society? Learn about science and religion, religion and social change/stability, religious organisations, relationships between social groups, significance of religion in the contemporary world.

Paper 3: Crime and Deviance with Theory and Methods – Exam worth 33 $\frac{1}{3}$ % of A-Level

1. Crime and Deviance: How does crime shape society? Learn about crime, deviance, social order and control, the social distribution of crime, globalisation and crime, crime control.
2. Theory and Methods: research methodology in sociology.

Career/real world

There are many different degree options available at universities which can also be paired with other subjects such as Sociology and Economics or Criminology. These will allow you to gain valuable skills for many careers such as social work, education, politics, law, HR, journalism, police or study further to gain a masters qualification.



A-Level Business Studies

Three written papers of two hours each at the end of the two-year course. Paper 1 is worth 35%, Paper 2 is worth 35%, Paper 3, which draws on a pre-released research theme, is worth 30%.

A-Level Spanish

This is a two-year A-Level course. You will be examined across four key skills at the end of the two years. Although the four key skills are the same as GCSE; listening, speaking, reading and writing, the topics which you study are different. You will learn about the history and culture of Spain and other countries in Latin America. You will be able to speak about social issues taking place in the world around you today. You will also get to study a Hispanic film and novel.

Course content

1. Social Issues and Trends: Hispanic society; family values, the influence of internet on young people today, women's rights, LGBT equality, immigration, racism and integration.
2. Political and Artistic Culture: Hispanic Culture; influence of famous people, identities of different Spanish regions, cultural heritage, young people in Spain today, the Spanish monarchy, the dictatorship of Franco and strikes/protests.
3. Grammar: The key to learning any language!
4. A Film Study: El Laberinto Del Fauno. A Mexican-Spanish movie written and directed by Guillermo del Toro, 2006.
5. A Literature Text: 'La Casa de Bernarda Alba'. A Spanish play by Federico García Lorca, 1939.

Assessment

Paper 1: Listening, reading and writing exam based on social issues and trends and political and artistic culture.

Paper 2: Writing exam based on the film and the novel.

Paper 3: Speaking exam based on an individual research project that you'll complete on a theme of your choice that you found interesting when studying the topics.

Career/real world

A language A-Level can be used at university alongside a range of different subjects. Some of the most popular combinations are Spanish and geography, Spanish and business or Spanish and travel and tourism.

- Accountancy.
- Advertising.

Performing Arts Extended Certificate

The Extended Certificate is for students who are interested in learning about the performing arts sector alongside other fields of study, with a view to progressing to a wide range of higher education courses, not necessarily in performing arts. This qualification gives a broad introduction to the performing arts sector with an emphasis on core knowledge and fundamental skills which are transferable across other sectors (including communication, presentation, physical and creative skills).

The three mandatory units focus on:

Unit 1 – Investigating Practitioners' Work (90GLH)

You will investigate the work of performing arts practitioners and develop critical analysis skills and contextual understanding of how practitioners communicate themes in their work. You will cover research, critical analysis and extended writing skills that aim to support your progression to higher education. You will gain a good understanding of the work of influential practitioners to inform your own work and practice

Unit 2 – Developing Skills and Techniques for Live Performance (90GLH)

You will explore technical performance skills with a focus on developing skills and techniques in at least two performance styles. You will cover an introduction to the performing arts where you will develop the appropriate skills and techniques in various performance disciplines within dance.

Unit 3 – Group Performance Workshop (120GLH)

You will explore and integrate creative and physical skills and techniques, working collaboratively to create a performance in response to a given stimulus. Within group performance you will develop the essential dance skills for the performing arts industry. You will develop physical techniques as well as wider transferable skills, such as being able to work collaboratively, personal management and organisation (rehearsals, time-management), being able to give and take direction, confidence in front of an audience, problem solving (refining the process) and teamwork (essential when dancing as a group). You will understand different audiences in different environments and will learn to adapt a performance to engage the target audience.

One further unit we study is:

Unit 12 – Contemporary Dance Technique (60GLH)

You will develop your knowledge, skills and techniques with an emphasis on practical development, application and performance skills. In this unit, you will develop the skills needed to be a contemporary dancer by participating in technique classes, rehearsals and performance. You will gain an understanding of this dance style and the key influences on its development through research and practical application. Throughout your learning and development you will be taught how to reflect on your progress and practice, which will support your development as a dancer.

Total course is 360 GLH (480 TQT) Equivalent in size to one A-Level. 4 units, of which three are mandatory and two are external. Mandatory content (83%). External assessment (58%).

Career/real world

University degree, professional dancer, choreographer, film and television, health and fitness instructor, teacher.



Health and Social Care Extended Certificate

The Level 3 Health and Social Care qualifications covers a broad basis of study for the health and social care sector. This qualification is designed to support progression to higher education when taken as part of a programme of study that includes other appropriate BTEC Nationals or A-Levels. This qualification has supported our past students in gaining places at university on nursing and midwifery courses.

The units studied are designed to support a student who wants to pursue a career in the health and social care industry.

There are three mandatory units that you will study:

Unit 1: Human Lifespan Development. Throughout this unit learners cover physical, intellectual, emotional and social development across the human lifespan, allowing them to develop a knowledge base for working with people in every stage of their lives, and understanding how their own experiences relate to health and wellbeing. External exam.

Unit 2: Working in Health and Social Care. Learners explore what it is like to work in the health and social care sector, including the roles and responsibilities of workers and organisations. External exam.


Unit 5: Meeting Individual Care and Support Needs. Learners focus on the principles and practicalities that underpin meeting individuals' care and support needs, which are the foundation of all the care disciplines. Learners will understand how to provide the care and support that individual's need, developing a good understanding of the principles behind providing quality care and support. Internal exam.

- Sociological Perspectives.

ICT Extended Certificate

IT is now embedded in our society and is a vital part of industries as diverse as entertainment, banking and manufacturing. The growth in ICT services, networking and data management is a key feature in global economies and the IT job market remains strong and relatively well paid. If this makes you interested in a career in ICT or a related field then this two-year programme will give you a good understanding of a broad range of ICT specialisms and will enable you to understand how ICT underpins business operation.

Equivalent in size to one A-Level. Four units of which three are core and one optional.

How will I be assessed?

Students are assessed through examinations and coursework. Assessment: two external and two internally assessed units.

Core units

Unit 1: Information and Technology Systems.

Unit 2: Creating Systems to Manage Information.

Unit 3: Using Social Media in Business.

Optional unit

Unit 5: Data Modelling.

Unit 1: Learners look at the theory around IT systems. This unit is assessed externally through a written paper.

Unit 2: Learners study the design, creation, testing and evaluation of a relational database system to manage information. This unit is assessed externally through a synoptic paper.

Unit 3: Learners explore how businesses use social media to promote their products and services and how social media is used. This unit is assessed internally.

Unit 5: Learners use data modelling techniques to manipulate the data into information using excel and its features. This unit is assessed internally.

Internally assessed assignments are set and marked by the Sixth Form team and verified by Pearson. These tasks follow a scenario that is tailored to a local industry which relies on them developing their skills to complete practical project over a period of time.

Career/real world

Students who study IT can continue to study many areas at university or gain employment.

- Software development.
- IT technician.

ICT Diploma

This qualification follows on from the National Extended certificate and provides you with more units in IT – if this is something you want to focus upon at university or seek employment in this field it maybe a qualification to consider.

Assessment over the two years The course is made up of a total of eight units of which six units are mandatory two optional units.

Core units

Unit 1: Information and Technology Systems – Externally examined exam.

Unit 2: Creating Systems to Manage Information –synoptic external assessment – design, create, test and evaluate a RDBMS.

Unit 3: Using Social Media in Business – Internally assessed.

Unit 4: Programming – Internally assessed.

Unit 9: IT Project Management – Internally assessed.

Unit 11: Cyber Security and Incident Management – Externally assessed.

Optional units

The optional units listed below are selected by the IT team to cover topics to meet your interests and aspirations.

- Data Modelling.
- Website Development.
- Software Testing.
- Customising and Integrating Applications.
- Cloud Storage and Collaboration Tools.
- Digital 2D and 3D Graphics.
- IT Technical Support and Management.
- Digital Animation and Effects.
- The Internet of Thing.
- Enterprise in IT.
- Business Process Modelling Tools.

The assessment of the IT qualification is the same as the Extended Certificate and takes a unit by unit approach and offer a combination of assessment styles. This gives learners the opportunity to showcase their skills and their knowledge in an appropriate, work related context and provide evidence of what they can do when they apply to higher education or employment.

No specific ICT skills are needed for this course although we will expect you to have used a personal computer at home or school and to be familiar with the Windows operating system. What is vital is a genuine curiosity in and enthusiasm for ICT, an interest in how ICT supports businesses and a desire to become an ICT professional.

Applied Law Extended Certificate

This qualification is for post-16 learners who want to continue their education through applied learning and to progress to:

- Higher education (University).
- Employment.
- An Advanced Apprenticeship (e.g. legal services).

The Extended Certificate is equivalent to one A-Level in size and therefore will attract the same UCAS points for further study at University. The qualification is made up of two internal assessments and two external assessments which are examined. Students will complete one internal and one external assessment in each year.

The units that students will study will include:

1. Dispute Solving in Civil Law. This is an external synoptic exam unit which will be sat at the end of Year 12 due to its synoptic element as the exam will incorporate issues and topics from unit 2.
2. Investigating Aspects of Criminal Law and the Legal System. This is a coursework unit which will be internally assessed.

The above units will be studied throughout Year 12.

3. Applying the Law through the Courts – Judicial Precedent and Statutory Interpretation. This is a mandatory larger external exam unit which will be sat at the end of Year 13.
4. Aspects of Family Law including marriage, divorce and maintenance (child and spousal). This unit is a smaller unit and is assessed through students completing coursework which will be internally assessed.

Within all units whether assessed through coursework or exam, students will be presented with real life legal issues and will have to apply the law to scenarios or 'clients'. As part of the course students will be assessed not only on their legal knowledge but their legal skills including legal research and interviewing/advising clients through face to face and written communications.

The above units will be studied throughout Year 13 along with the opportunity to resit the exam unit from Year 12.

Career/real world

Studying Law is a great foundation to further legal studies such as a law degree or combined law degree for example with history or a language or another social science such as criminology or psychology. There are many careers that you could embark on including a career in the police, train to be a solicitor or barrister, train to become part of the judiciary (i.e. become a judge) or become a social worker working in areas such as elderly care and children in relation to fostering, adoption and child protection.



Creative Digital Media Production Extended Certificate

The course is made up of four units.

Unit 1: Media Representations: You will study a range of media from different sectors: music videos, short film extracts, animation, news programmes, websites, digital games and print adverts. You will be able to explore how meaning, messages and values are constructed through formal and stylistic elements. This is an examined unit of work.

Unit 4: Pre-Production Portfolio: You will produce a digital media product. You will create a portfolio and manage the pre-production for your own creative media production. This is an exciting opportunity to be creative and explore what it would be like to work in the profession! (Portfolio unit)

Unit 8: Responding to a Commission: You will understand how to respond to a commission brief with ideas based on the required content, style, audience, purpose, and approach proposed by the client. You will work within the requirements and constraints of the client's specifications and consider your response in terms of ethos, format, budget, platform, and duration. (Examined unit - with pre-release brief).

Unit 14: Digital Magazine Production: You will explore codes and conventions of different magazine genres and platforms. You will select and prepare content and create layouts for a specific genre of magazine. (Assignment portfolio unit).

- Equivalent in size to one A-Level.
- Four units of which two are mandatory and two are external.
- Mandatory content (83%).
- External assessment (58%).

Career/real world

This qualification provides both academic and employment opportunities. You could study the following courses:

- BA (Hons) Media Studies, BA (Hons) Computer Animation, BA (Hons) Media Production, BA (Hons) Digital Television Production.

It would provide a significant advantage when applying for entry level roles in the industry such as a runner or production assistant within a television or film production company, or as a games tester in games company, or to apprenticeships in 2D visual effects or digital content.

- BSc (Hons) Broadcast Audio Technology.



Music Practitioners Diploma

The Music Practitioners qualifications is designed to provide a vocationally-relevant education in contemporary music, aimed at beginners through to semi-professionals. Sport Studies

Extended Certificate

How will I be assessed?

Students are assessed through examinations and coursework. The exams will be held at the end of Year 1 and coursework focus is for Year 2. There are four units to be completed which is equal to one A-Level.

Mandatory units

- Unit 1: Anatomy and Physiology (external exam).
- Unit 2: Fitness Training and Programming for Health, Sport and Well Being (external assessment).
- Unit 3: Professional Development in the Sports Industry.

Optional unit

- Unit 4: Sports Leadership.

Unit 1: Anatomy and Physiology: aims to cement how the skeletal, muscular, cardiovascular and respiratory systems function and the fundamentals of the energy systems.

This unit is assessed via a 1.5 hour examination.

Unit 2: Fitness Training and Programming for Health, Sport and Well Being: combines lifestyle factors affecting health, nutrition, fitness training and fitness programming, which is then assessed through task-based external two-hour examination.

Unit 3: Professional Development in the sports Industry: learners will research different possible careers and associated job roles in the sports industry. This unit is assessed internally.

Unit 4: Sports Leadership: aims to develop learners' confidence in a variety of different roles when leading sport. Learners need to be willing to stand in front of a group to develop this area. This unit is assessed internally.

Career/real world

Students who study sport can continue to study many areas at university. An example of just some of the careers within the sport, exercise science and technology, sports business and leisure management, sport development, leadership and coaching, outdoor education, fitness instruction and performance.



Sport Studies Diploma

How will I be assessed?

Students are assessed through examinations and coursework. The exams will be held at the end of Year 1 and coursework focus is for Year 2. There are nine units to be completed which is equal to two A-Levels.

The units from the extended certificate will be completed with the following units.

Mandatory units

- Unit 22: Investigating Business in Sport and Active Leisure Industry (External Assessment).
- Unit 23: Skill Acquisition in Sport.

Optional unit

- Unit 6: Sports Psychology.
- Unit 7: Practical Sports.
- Unit 10: Sports Events Organisation.

Unit 22: Investigating Business in Sport and Active Leisure Industry: learners will investigate how business operates in the sport and leisure industry and how it responds to trends and other influences. This unit is assessed externally over 3 hours.

Unit 23: Skill Acquisition in Sport: learners study the factors that contribute to a skilled performance in sport and examine how sports performers learn and develop skills. This unit is assessed internally.

Unit 6: Sports Psychology: learners will look at individual psychological factors that influence performance and how to enhance performance. This unit is assessed internally.

Unit 7: Practical Sport: Learners will study skills, techniques, tactics and rules of selected sports through active participation. This unit is assessed internally.

Unit 10: Sports Event Organisation: learners will plan, promote and deliver an approved sports event. Learners need to be willing to lead different age groups for this unit. This unit is assessed internally.

Career/real world

Students who study sport can continue to study many areas at university. An example of just some of the careers within the sport, exercise science and technology, sports business and leisure management, sport development, leadership and coaching, outdoor education, fitness instruction and performance



Animal Care Subsidiary Diploma

Equivalent in size to one A-Level. Consists of seven units one of which is mandatory and none are externally assessed.

Core units

Unit 1: Understand and Promote Animal Health (10 Credits)

Learning about animal health is an interesting and important subject for anyone thinking of working in the animal care industry. Whatever animals are used for, their health has to be optimum for them to fulfill their purpose, whether as a pet, a working animal or an animal kept in a collection such as a zoo.

Optional units

Unit 4: Undertake Animal Handling and Safe Working (10 Credits)

Animal handling skills are essential for working with animals. You will learn how to handle animals safely according to industry guidelines and health and safety legislation.

Unit 5: Plan and Monitor Animal Feeding (5 Credits)

Feeding animals is a vital husbandry skill when caring for all types of animals. You will learn how to provide food to animals safely, following animal welfare and health and safety requirements, and to plan and monitor animal feeding regimes.

Unit 6: Manage Animal Accommodation (5 Credits)

Planning for and maintaining an animal's accommodation is a vital part of their general care. You will learn how to plan and maintain accommodation, including the theory behind what should make up the accommodation and how it complies with relevant animal welfare legislation.

Unit 13: Understand and Interpret Animal Behaviour and Communication (10 Credits)

You will learn and understand both normal and abnormal behaviour and the triggering factors of a number of species, in order to care for animals properly.

Unit 18: Understand the Principles of Exotic Animal Health (10 credits)

You will learn about the husbandry and management of exotic animals in captivity. The unit covers health, welfare, handling, restraint, nutrition and feeding.


Unit 29: Undertake Animal Training (10 Credits)

In this unit you will learn how to train a selected animal. You will plan a training programme for your chosen animal, carry it out and report on the results.

Career/real world

This qualification is designed primarily to support progression to employment. Students completing this size qualification could access entry roles in areas such as:

- Kennel or cattery assistant.
- Animal care assistant, in an animal business, charity or wildlife trust.
- Retail assistant, in a pet or animal-related retail establishment.
- Assistant to an animal trainer, e.g. trainer of assistance dogs for the disabled.
- Animal technician, in an animal centre.



BTEC Level 3 National Extended Certificate in Engineering

The course

This is a two-year course which is the equivalent to one A-Level including mandatory units Scientific principles, processes to generate safe products as well as generating and transforming ideas. Students' progress onto optional units involving computer aided design and drawing techniques.

What will I study?

For the Extended Certificate there is 360 guided learning hours which will include:

- Unit 1 – Scientific principles – Mechanical, electrical and electronic (external exam)
- Unit 2 – Processes to generate safe products and services as a team
- Unit 3 – Generating and Transforming ideas (external assessed unit)
- Unit 10 – Computer Aided design for Engineering

How will I be assessed?

You will complete an external exam based upon Scientific principles, but also develop a portfolio of written work and engineering drawings to evidence your coursework. There is both internally and externally assess units. Your work will be marked as pass, merit or distinction.

Why study Engineering?

Engineering is the 'application of scientific principles and practical to generate and transform ideas and materials, as part of a team, into safe products and services'.

Engineering is the design and production of useful products and services. Many seemingly simple aspects of our daily lives have been conceptualised, designed and developed by an engineer. If this sounds like your thing, then select engineering!

This course will prepare you for a degree course in various sectors of engineering such as electrical engineering, civil engineering, automotive engineering, computer engineering... the list is endless. You may even choose to go straight into employment or into an apprenticeship.



Fashion and Textile Design

Extended certificate

The course

This is an exciting and hands-on practical course where you will be able to experiment with all aspects of fashion and clothing. You will be encouraged to creatively explore materials, techniques and processes in order to fully develop your unique and individual design style. You will study historical fashion, crafts, design, fashion and textiles to develop a broad knowledge of subject, which you will then use as inspiration for your innovative ideas.

What will I study?

Year 1: You will learn the basic skills required, from research, design to making your final garment. Within the first year you will cover 3 units of work. These range from the study of organic form, communication through art and design and a collaborative project working with the students in your group along with another collaborative party.


Year 2: This year also covers three units of work. Topics covered are historical fashion, education within art and design and garment production. This year focuses on the more specific information you will need for a career within the fashion industry, looking at the manufacturing process along with building your skills.

How will I be assessed?

All units are coursework based and will be internally assessed through your subject teachers. Coursework will be assessed through observation, assignment, tutorials and group critiques along with presentations and a final exhibition of your work. Samples of your work are also externally assessed by a moderator.

Why study Fashion and Textile Design?

Today, the fashion industry has truly transformed into a global industry where fashion designers, clothing manufacturers, fashion merchandisers and retailers come together from all the corners of the globe to come up with new styles and designs of clothing, shoes and accessories which would appeal to all age and market ranges. Because of this, it is considered as a great field to work in and one of the best professions that you can consider having in this field would be that of a fashion and textile designer.



Film Studies A-Level

Do you love films? If the answer is yes, then this is the correct course for you! You will never watch films in the same way again! In Film Studies we consider what is the purpose of any scene, technique, and character and consider how meaning is created. Filmmakers use a range of techniques to construct narrative meaning and to generate a response from the audience. The key elements of film form consist of cinematography, mise-en-scène (what's on screen), editing, sound design and performance and make up the basics for learners' study of film at A-Level. These key elements provide a means of approaching narrative as well as other aspects of film studies (such as spectatorship, aesthetic issues and the auteur), all of which learners will study throughout their course.

All films on the course are studied for:

- Key elements of film form
- Meaning and response in film
- The contexts of film

Some films on the course are looked at using specialist study areas:

- Spectatorship
- Narrative
- Ideology
- Auteur
- Critical debates
- Filmmakers' theories (documentary)

Units:

Component 1 – Varieties of film and filmmaking, written exam: two hours 30 minutes (35%)

This component assesses knowledge and understanding of six feature-length films.

- Section A: Hollywood 1930-1990 (comparative study)
One question from a choice of two, requiring reference to two Hollywood films, one from the Classical Hollywood period (1930-1960) and the other from the New Hollywood period (1961-1990).
- Section B: American film since 2005 (two film study)
One question from a choice of two, requiring reference to two American films, one mainstream film and one contemporary independent film.
- Section C: British film since 1995 (two film study)
One question from a choice of two, requiring reference to two British films.

Component 2 – Global filmmaking perspectives, written exam: two hours 30 minutes (35%)

This component assesses knowledge and understanding of five feature-length films.

- Section A: Global film (two-film study)
One question from a choice of two, requiring reference to two global films; one European and one produced outside Europe.
- Section B: Documentary film
One question from a choice of two, requiring reference to one documentary film.
- Section C: Film movements – silent cinema
One question from a choice of two, requiring reference to one silent film or group of films.
- Section D: Film movements – experimental film
One question from a choice of two, requiring reference to one film option

Component 3 – Production, non-exam assessment (30%)

This component assesses one production and its evaluative analysis. You will produce:

- a screenplay for a short film (1600 – 1800 words) plus a
- digitally photographed storyboard of a key section from the screenplay
- an evaluative analysis (1700 – 2000 words)



VTCT Level 2 Diploma in Beauty Therapy

The VTCT Level 2 Diploma in Beauty Therapy is a substantial vocational qualification for learners seeking a career as a junior beauty therapist. This qualification is designed for learners aged 16 years or over and will support you to gain employment as a junior beauty therapist, as the units contained in this qualification cover all the skills and knowledge required for this role. Entry onto this qualification can be via previous attainment of A-Level, one qualification in beauty therapy and/or a successful skills test and interview. This is a vocational qualification and includes all the required elements to work effectively as a junior therapist including, mandatory units covering the following: facial skincare, waxing, eyelash and eyebrow treatments, manicure, pedicure, make up, tanning client care and health and safety. The structure of this qualification provides you with the flexibility to develop your knowledge, understanding and skills required to become a junior beauty therapist.

Assessment

VTCT qualifications are assessed and quality assured by centre staff. Work will be set to improve your practical skills, knowledge and understanding. For practical elements, you will be observed by your assessor. All your work must be collected in a portfolio of evidence and cross-referenced to requirements listed in this record of assessment book. Assessments will be carried out through observations and online exams per unit.

- Students will be expected to work on real clients.
- Students will also receive a free uniform (tunic).

Career/real world

Career opportunities exist in a variety of contexts as a junior beauty therapist, including:

- Working in commercial beauty salons
- Working in a retail concession in a department store
- Working independently/self-employed/mobile/home-based setting



VTCT Level 3 Diploma in Beauty Therapy

The VTCT Level 3 Diploma in Spa Therapy Studies is a technical level qualification that provides learners with the knowledge, understanding and skills to work as a spa therapist. The content of this qualification is comprised of all the required elements to work effectively as a spa therapist including health and safety, client care and communication, providing spa treatments such as hydrotherapy, body wraps wet flotation and dry flotation as well as how to operate, monitor and maintain the spa area including sauna and steam other equipment. These units are all mandatory. Learners also have the opportunity to undertake optional units to enhance their range of practical skills such as body massage, massage using pre-blended aromatherapy oils, body electrotherapy, stone therapy and Indian head massage. The qualification is comprised of four mandatory units and in order to be awarded the qualification, learners must also gain a minimum of 20 credits from units in the optional group.

Assessment

VTCT qualifications are assessed and quality assured by centre staff. Work will be set to improve your practical skills, knowledge and understanding. For practical elements, you will be observed by your assessor. All your work must be collected in a portfolio of evidence and cross-referenced to requirements listed in this record of assessment book. Assessments will be carried out through observations and online exams per unit.

- Students will be expected to work on real clients.

Career/real world

Career opportunities as a spa therapist exist in a variety of contexts, including: beauty salons, day spas, independent/self-employed/mobile/home-based settings, product manufacturing and training, destination/hotel spa's, HM Prison Service, cruise liners.





VTCT Level 2 Diploma in Woman's Hairdressing

This qualification has been specifically designed for the 16-19 age group, and will develop the knowledge, understanding and skills to prepare learners for employment as a junior hairdresser/stylist. Learners will have their hairdressing skills assessed in a real or realistic working environment. This qualification includes all the required elements to work effectively as a junior hairdresser/stylist including: health and safety; client consultation; shampoo and conditioning hair; the research unit - working in the hair industry; cut women's hair; colour and lighten hair and the art of dressing hair. These units are all mandatory. Learners will also develop their understanding and skills by selecting a number of optional specialist units which include: reception duties promoting products and services to clients; This qualification's structure provides learners with the flexibility to develop the knowledge, understanding and skills depending upon their designated career pathway as a junior hairdresser/stylist.



VTCT Level 3 Diploma in Woman's Hairdressing

This qualification has been specifically designed for the 16-19 age group, builds on existing knowledge and understanding of hairdressing and will develop an enhanced repertoire of technical skills to prepare learners for employment as a senior hairdresser/stylist. Learners will have their hairdressing skills assessed in a real or realistic working environment. The qualification includes all the required elements to work effectively as an advanced hairdresser/stylist including: health and safety; client consultation; advanced cutting; styling and colouring techniques and; selling products and services to clients. These units are all mandatory. Learners will further develop their understanding and skills by selecting a number of optional specialist units which include: hair colour correction and bridal hairstyling. This qualification's structure provides learners with the flexibility to develop the knowledge, understanding and skills depending upon their designated career pathway as a senior hairdresser/stylist.

How will I be assessed?

Assessment of your work will come from formal observations required for each qualification, throughout the year. Alongside qualification portfolios, that are externally verified. Our 1st4Sports qualifications have no examinations. Our course is perfect for students aged 16–19 with a passion for sport who would like to train to become a sports coach.

Year 12: An Introduction to the Practical and Theoretical Aspects of Coaching

The first year of the course is designed to provide learners with an introduction to the practical and theoretical aspects of coaching.

Year 13: Development of Coaching Knowledge and Delivery for Working Coaches

The second year gives the opportunity to develop physical education and school sport knowledge and skills that can be applied to different educational and school sport related settings. While also giving an introduction to other opportunities to work in physical education and as school sport professionals.

During the two-year SGI Sports Study Programme you will work towards industry recognised 1st4Sport qualifications including:

- FA Coaching Badges.
- First Aid.
- Child Protection and DBS/CRB Certificates.
- Level 2 National Coaching Qualifications (industry recognised).
- Level 3 National Coaching Qualifications (industry recognised).

Enrichment opportunities

Students will have the opportunity to gain both voluntary and paid placements as well as having access to match analysis software to take the further step into professional sport, making you stand out from the crowd!

Career/real world

The ultimate goal at the end of our student's programme is to have them ready and employable to the sporting sector, school sector and the leisure sector. We have several partners that we work alongside in getting our students employed in their dream job. One particular partner we work very close with is Challenger Sport. An organisation that take young people to coach sport in America, this progression pathway is a life-changing experience.

Learners following the SGI Sports Study Programme will be required to complete an access to Higher Education Level 3 qualification, if they wish to continue their study's and apply for university. Students who study sport can continue to study many areas at university, for example; sport, exercise science and technology, leisure management, sport development, leadership and coaching and fitness instruction.



Edexcel Functional Skills Level 2 English

This course is available to students who had below A-Level 3 at GCSE English. The Level 2 Functional Skills is in three sections: reading, writing and speaking, listening and communicating. All three sections need to be passed to pass the whole qualification. The assessments can be done online or on paper.

The course is designed to use texts that would be read in the real world such as leaflets, newspaper articles etc. Some of the questions are multiple choice, some short answer and some medium length. The writing tasks are all practical pieces such as writing an email of complaint. The assessment of spelling, punctuation and grammar are especially important in this section and worth 42% of the mark. As a result of this, lessons will begin with a clear focus on these skills. The spoken element consists of giving a talk and a question and answer session.

- Reading is assessed through a 75 minute examination and is based on three non-fiction texts.
- Writing assessment is based on a 60 minute examination where two tasks are completed in a specific format for a particular audience. Accuracy is especially important.
- Speaking, listening and communication is internally assessed and the whole assessment will be between 15 and 25 minutes.
- Each component can be retaken.

This qualification is a great springboard to further education or GCSE English.

Career/real world

This is a qualification that allows you onto many further education courses and apprenticeships. English qualifications are vital to virtually all career options you may choose. The Functional Skills course is aimed at written, spoken and reading in real world contexts which apply to all walks of life.



GCSE English Language

This course will give you an opportunity to retake your English Language GCSE. You will have assigned lessons to guide you through the reading and writing sections of the exam. You will have specific sessions working through exam technique, analysis of text, transactional writing and narrative writing. There will be opportunities for you to sit the GCSE exam in November and the summer.

Language Component 1: 40% of GCSE

Section A (20%): reading (40 marks): This section will test you through a range of questions about an unseen extract from a 20th century literature extract. You will need to analyse language, relationships and evaluate texts. You will practice these skills in lessons and be presented with a range of texts prior to your exam. You will need to select and retrieve information, analyse quotes and form opinions.

Section B (20%): writing (40 marks): You will need to write a narrative with a choice of four options of titles. This should be a narrative or a recount. You will be taught how to use language effectively, how to structure a story and how to make believable characters.

Language Component 2: 60% of GCSE

Section A (30%): reading (40 marks): This section will test you through a range of questions about two unseen non-fiction texts. One will be from the 19th century and one will be from the 21st century. You will need to analyse language, comment on texts and their purpose and select and retrieve information. You will be asked to synthesise information between texts and compare and contrast viewpoints, use of language and effect.

Section B (30%): writing (40 marks): You will need to write two transactional writing tasks. The options will be: a letter, a report, a review, a leaflet/guide, an article or a speech. You will learn how to write in different formats and styles, how to write persuasively and use language for precise purposes. You will learn how to use punctuation correctly and how to engage a reader.

Career/real world

You need an English qualification for most jobs, educational courses and apprenticeships. It is important to be able to communicate effectively and express yourself clearly. Reading and writing with sophistication and style is a sure fire way to get noticed and get your job application to the top of the pile.



Edexcel Functional Skills Level 2 Mathematics

Functional Skills qualifications provide reliable evidence of a learner's achievements against demanding content that is relevant to the workplace. The qualifications assess learners' underpinning subject knowledge and their ability to apply this knowledge to different contexts. They provide a foundation for progression to employment and further technical education, and they help learners to develop skills for everyday life. The Pearson Edexcel Functional Skills Qualification in Mathematics at Level 2 consists of one externally assessed assessment. Each assessment comprises two sections – a non-calculator section (calculator prohibited) and a calculator section (calculator permitted).

The assessments are available as paper-based and onscreen, on-demand assessment. Section A and Section B are presented as separate question and answer booklets and must be taken in the same examination session.

Career/real world

Learners who achieve the Pearson Edexcel Functional Skills Qualification in Mathematics at Levels 1 and 2 can progress to further mandatory mathematical study, such as GCSE, the workplace or further vocational study.

- Comprehend, interpret and communicate mathematical information in a variety of forms appropriate to the information and context.

Career/real world

The course provides a strong foundation for further academic and vocational study and for employment, to give students the appropriate mathematical skills, knowledge and understanding to help them progress to a full range of courses in further and higher education. This includes Level 3 mathematics courses as well as Level 3 and undergraduate courses in other disciplines such as biology, geography and psychology, where the understanding and application of mathematics is crucial.

OBA Scholars

Students achieving high GCSE results at grades 9-7 or A*- A, have a number of opportunities available to them. Every year the Academy sends a strong cohort of students to university including, Russell Group universities. We support the progress of students in the following ways:

- Liverpool Scholars which sees students receive both a cost and grade offer reduction to the University of Liverpool.
- Individualised tuition in chosen subjects.
- Access to gifted and talented university programmes.
- Links to the Sutton Trust which promotes social mobility through education.
- An association with the Nuffield Bursary which provides financial assistance for students considering a medical degree.
- Demonstration of key skills for university by undertaking the Extended Project Qualification (EPQ).

Students who wish to apply to Oxford or Cambridge will be given extra support and advice with their application from their pastoral form tutor. Expert professionals from the Ormiston Academies Trust (OAT) will also assist in this process.



Support

Pastoral

Life in Sixth Form is both exciting and challenging. While it's vital you develop both your independent living and study skills we recognise that sometimes a little extra help is necessary. You will be given a personal tutor who can help you settle into Sixth Form quickly. They will be with you throughout your journey at OBA and will be your first port of call for all queries and concerns you have, offering the following:

Destinations

Every year we proud to see many Year 13 students be offered places at a wide range of Universities across the country, including in those many Russell group locations. As an Academy we are able to offer extensive support and advice as students move through this process. This includes:

- Personal statement workshops.
- UCAS application clinics.
- Student Finance evenings to support parents/carers with applications.
- Accommodation advice.
- Scholarship workshops.

This support is also available to students who are interested in applying for Apprenticeships. We have seen many students go off into apprenticeships at all levels, helping to create professional relationships with local companies. The support that is offered here includes; Apprenticeship Open Days, In-house career days, CV and cover letter workshops, Mock Interview prep including presentation prep and Regular job advert updates.



Bridging the Gap Programme

The Transition from GCSE to A-Level/Level 3 Courses

Rationale for students

The move from GCSE to A-Level/Level 3 courses can be daunting and it presents some different challenges than you might have experienced before. Here at OBA we want to support you through this transition as you embark on your Sixth Form career.

The content at A-

3 is much broader than what you will have covered at GCSE and there is a need for much more independent studying both in school and at home. The Bridging the Gap programme has been developed in order to support you through this changeover and prepare you for your courses in Year 12.

- Get a head start on your courses.
- Gain an insight into work that you will be undertaking in September.
- Understand the type of learning that you will be expected to complete independently.

You will receive Bridging the Gap resources from each of the subjects you have chosen that has been designed to prepare you for studying in September. It is important that you complete this work over the summer in order to make the best possible start to your courses in Sixth Form.

College productions Both the drama and music showcases provide an opportunity to not only sing, act and dance but also to learn valuable behind the scenes skills such as lighting, sound and stage design. You can also get involved with bands, choirs and media workshops as part of the enrichment programme.


