### SHAPING FUTURES

The Merseyside Collaborative Outreach Programme

Students at OBA have received a wealth of careers education this half term. Year 9 have received a talk from a Microbiologist from Edge Hill University, linking their recent science topic on cells and microscopes with careers in this biological field. Year 7 had a remote session with a doctor who discussed his career journey as a young doctor and how to get into the field of medicine. Year 10 have received a visit from the RAF. who talked about the wide variety of careers available; Year 8 received a visit from Everton FC who talked about careers in health and nutrition.

In addition to this Year's 11, 12 and 13 have received a talk from the Apprenticeship Support and Knowledge service and Year 11 have been visited by Riverside College. Careers education is an important part of our Lessons for Life programme, with all year groups receiving careers learning during the year. So far in Lessons for Life this year our Year 11 have learned about career planning as well as having a CV writing session and Years 11 and 12 have received logins and an introduction to the career's website Unifrog.

Over the next half term, we will be welcoming a variety of guest

speakers including an owner of a head-hunting recruitment business who will be visiting Year 11 and our Sixth Form and we will be receiving a visit from Shaping Futures, who will be hosting three sessions with Year 9 which will include discussing life at university. In addition to this, all of our Year 11 and Year 13 students will receive a one-to-one meeting with our qualified impartial careers advisor to help them to make the right careers decisions. Any other student is welcome to make an appointment with our career's advisor - all they need to do is ask their form tutor to organise it.

# OBA Pop Up Shop

OBA opened the doors to its first ever community pop-up shop this term! The academy took over a unit in Runcorn Shopping City on Thursday 18th November and invited parents/carers to drop in whilst shopping, to pick up items of necessity.

#### **Remembrance at OBA**

However, this was replaced on 11th November by a reflective silence, as each one of our students quietly paid their respects. Around the academy, poppies were displayed on the doors of all Year 7, 8 and 9 form rooms, decorated by our students, many of whom wrote personal messages of thanks on the poppies before adding them to the display.



### Saturday 'WOW' Day

It was a real pleasure to welcome 47 budding computer scientists to our Computer Science WOW day on Saturday 13th November. Students had the opportunity to develop computational thinking skills across a variety of activities. They had to use commands to direct a lunar module to safety, avoiding any of the hazards along the way. There was an opportunity to develop programming skills to create their own games using a block-based programming environment and finally, students had to use only 4 straws, 2 pieces of card and sellotape to create a structure to protect an egg that was dropped from a height of over 20ft.

Computer Science teacher, Mr O'Leary said "We had an 'eggscellent' time and hope that everyone enjoyed their time with us! It was great to be able to share with some of our local primary students some of the software and learning opportunities that we have available in the Computer Science department here at OBA. Everyone was given a learning pack to take away with them so they could continue their computer science journey at home. We look forward to seeing you all at the next WOW day."



# Navy Submariner Shares Experiences with OBA Students




On Tuesday 7th December, Chief Petty Officer John Ramos visited Ormiston Bolingbroke Academy to give talks to students about life as a submariner, what it was like to work with nuclear weaponry. how he became an engineer and what to expect when working in the military. CPO John Ramos first started his military career in the tank division in the army, before moving on to the Navy and working his way up to Chief Petty Officer in the submariners. CPO Ramos did four talks throughout the day, working with Year 12, Year 10 and Year 9.

With Year 12, CPO Ramos did two sessions - a talk about his experience of life in the submariners, as well as then completing a session on aspirations and how to achieve your goals.

Mrs Styles, Head of English at OBA said, "The students had lots of good questions and engaged really well with our visitor." With Year 10 and Year 9, CPO Ramos talked to the students about what to expect when starting a career within the military, what it meant to be a submariner and how he set his goals and achieved them.

CPO Ramos was blown away by our students, stating that 'the questions they asked were to a high standard, including some very technical questions which was impressive to see'. He also said that he thought he had spotted 'a few future engineers under [our] care'.

### **Year 8 History Trip**



Over two days at the start of December, Year 8 students had the opportunity to visit the Liverpool Maritime and Slavery Museum. The purpose of this trip was to coincide with their local study on Liverpool's role in the Slave Trade and the effect the Industrial Revolution had on the area. The students really engaged with the different exhibits and artefacts and the museum staff were incredibly accommodating and welcoming for our students. The students spent the day covering all four floors of the museums and left with a great deal of respect for the history of Liverpool and in particular, the impact of slavery, both in Liverpool and globally.

Mr McGlory, the Curriculum leader

for Humanities, said "The students were amazed by all the interactive exhibits and were blown away by many of the artefacts that they witnessed. The museum was brilliant and allowed the students to truly dive into the history on show. The students were a credit to the school and couldn't wait to come back to school to share with their history teachers what they had learnt. The Year 7s will have something amazing to look forward to next year".

The local history study is a core element of the History National Curriculum, so with the Maritime and Slavery Museum on our doorstep it was the perfect choice to fit with our historical unit on slavery and industry.



# **OBA and MWCP Celebrate**Interfaith week 2021





Ormiston Bolingbroke Academy (OBA) has joined forces once again with Murdishaw West Community Primary School (MWCP) to help promote and celebrate Interfaith Week 2021.



The annual national initiative, which took place this year during the week commencing 15th November, aims to highlight the tremendous contribution that faith communities make to society and to foster good inter-faith relations at all levels.

Each class at MWCP was assigned a Bible story to focus on and to support their work, students in year groups 3-6 visited OBA for a RE lesson with subject specialist staff at the academy. Year 6 studied the 5 pillars of Islam, where they compared 5 core practices in their own lives to the 5 pillars within Islam. Year 5 found

out about the life of a Buddha and how he became the Buddha, while Year 4 learned about Judaism; particularly looking at key religious figures and the events that happened to them by performing freeze frames of their key moments. Year 3 focused on Hindu Gods, looking at the symbols and appearance of some of the major Gods of Hinduism.

Additionally, all students at MWCP were set a challenge by OBA to create a piece of religious art and the results were impressive! Students in each year group worked together to create a masterpiece based on a different story in the Bible.



#### **Lessons for Life Update**



It has been another busy half term for our Lessons for Life programme this half term with a wide range of projects undertaken by our students as part of their Personal, Social, Health Education.

Year 7 students have been learning about their physical health and development and how their bodies will change in the coming months and years. In Years 8 and 9 students have been learning about staying safe in a project which covers topics such as water safety, road safety, staying safe online as well as other statutory safeguarding concerns, including abuse, harmful sexual behaviour and Female Genital Mutilation.

Year 11 students spent this half term working on a new Lessons for Life project named the 'Dare to Shine' programme. This programme of activity is timed to link to the academic calendar and aims to prepare students for their mock exams and future choices. As part of this project Year 11 students had a briefing on mock exam study skills, learned about exam command words, reflected on their mock exam results and also considered their future choices by completing CVs and looking at the post 16 options available to them.



January 2022 will see a range of new exciting project and initiatives coming forward for our students' Personal, Social, Health Education.

A massive well done goes to all students for their hard work and maturity shown on all their projects this term and also to all the staff who deliver Lessons for Life to form groups.

On Monday 22nd November, Miss McKevitt took 35 performing arts students to the UCAS 'Create Your Future' convention in Manchester. This was a unique face-to-face experience which enabled our students to find out about hundreds of creative courses, apprenticeships and careers in design, music and the performing arts.

Market style stalls set out throughout the convention Centre allowed students to talk to staff and students from universities and colleges all over the country offering a wide range of courses at Higher Education and Further Education level. Students were treated to an array of freebies from the stalls including bottles, notebooks, stationary and guitar picks. OBA students independently ventured to as many stalls as they could within

the 2-hour time slot available. They also got to be in the audience for some extremely stand out performances from current students of Liverpool's Media Academy.

Miss McKevitt, said "It was a delight to see all students asking so many in depth questions regarding a possible career pathway in the performing and creative arts industry. They represented the academy to an extremely high standard I hope some will now have a greater understanding or idea of where they would like to see themselves after their OBA journey. # TikTok Study - Harmful Challenges and Hoaxes

TikTok continues to be very pro-active in relation to online harms. I'm not defending them, there's still lots to do, but they are doing much more than any of the other platforms out there, many of whom are doing nothing.

Many online challenges are harmless, fun and can even be positive, such as supporting charitable causes. But there are many that are risky and potentially harmful. Recently TikTok commissioned a study looking at harmful/dangerous challenges, stating that 1 in 5 teenagers have taken part in an online challenge, 1 in 50 have taken part in a challenge the teen has deemed to be risky and dangerous, and 1 in 300 have taken part in a really dangerous challenge.

The study is based on responses from teachers, parents and 5,400 teenagers aged 13-19 in various countries, including the UK and one outcome of the study is that warning labels will appear on potential

The age requirement for Discord is 17+, although there are no stringent checks to verify age and Discord is very popular with high school students. Over the years she has also thrown herself into other parts of school life – volunteering for duties, helping on results days, and in the past supporting PTA groups.

We will all miss Pat terribly, but she has definitely earned her retirement and we know that she is really looking forward to spending more time with her family.
