
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Mental Health Ambassadors

This term Mr McGlory, alongside some family members took part in the Total Warrior Challenge in Leeds on Saturday 25th June. He had to compete by completing a 12-kilometre course and 25 obstacles - some through water, mud and one through fire. But the team managed to complete it in under 2 hours, with their original aim being under 2 and a half hours. Mr McGlory took on this challenge to raise money for the DEC Ukraine Appeal and with donations from friends, family, work colleagues and the OBA community, they have currently raised over £850 for the charity to support in helping refugees from Ukraine and those still in the country. UCAS Trip

On Tuesday 28th June a group of Year 12 pupils visited the UCAS Convention in Liverpool. This gave pupils a chance to talk to further education and apprenticeship providers and gave an opportunity for our Sixth Formers to do more research into their post 18 options. The convention was attended by most of the leading Universities in the UK and throughout the day pupils had the chance to listen to a series of lectures about post 18 choices and pathways. The year 12s who attended the convention seemed to have some really good conversations about their future plans and returned to OBA ready to finalise choices and complete those all-important post 18 applications.

Knife Crime Performance



Altru Theatre Company attended OBA on Friday 1st July to deliver an informative and educational piece of theatre to Year 9 students, portraying the life of a young male, who had embroiled himself in situations which led to the use of a knife and physical violence. This piece explored the seriousness and possible consequences of knife crime and being involved in county lines. We were able to access this excellent opportunity through our partnership with Cheshire Constabulary and our school liaison officer PC Suzi Williams.





This half term has been a busy one for careers education at OBA!

Most of our Year 10 and Year 12 students were able to attend work experience placements, which is something that hasn't been possible for the last two years. Students attended a wide variety of placements which included animal care, engineering and construction companies, solicitors, education settings and government agencies. Students were able to develop a range of employability skills as well as getting inside knowledge of the industries that they might want to pursue as careers. For the small number of Year 10 students who were unable to attend placements, careers sessions were delivered every day in school, including a virtual work experience project delivered by Ormiston Academies Trust (OAT).

Our Year 9 students attended a "Learn to Earn" session, delivered by **Young Enterprise** and kindly

funded by **Kawneer UK**. This session covers budgeting for households, with students putting together a yearly budget for their dream lifestyle. They then learn how much you could earn in a variety of careers. This sometimes means that students need to set more realistic budgets, but the aim is also to motivate students in their school work – if they want to achieve their dream lifestyle then they will need to work hard! The session also covers labour market information, investigating which jobs there may be more or less of in the future, helping students to think about what the world of work might look like when they're applying for their first jobs.





Year 9 also attended three sessions delivered by Shaping Futures as part of their Lessons for Life programme. These included sessions on life at university, labour market information and the alternative pathways they can choose at 16, which included apprenticeships, college and sixth form. Year 9 also attended an options fair as part of Lessons for Life to help them to make the GCSE choices that are right for them.

empowering young people to make positive change

HumanUtopia visited OBA in June to deliver their "Who Am I?" day to our Year 8 and Year 9 students. These sessions are both inspirational and motivational and can have a profound impact on the students involved, some of whom were brave enough to take the mic and speak in front of their year group for the first time.

The sessions cover students reflecting on their comfort zones and how they became the person that they are. The session then

moves on to consider how life could be if students could interact differently, and students are encouraged to work with others outside of their usual friendship group.

Students reflect on how the words and behaviour of others have impacted on them, and how they can also impact on the lives of others, both positively and negatively.

The session concludes with the students considering and listing

the best things about themselves and making positive plans for the future, which they then take away with them to keep.

OBA prides itself on being an inclusive and safe environment for all of our students and working with HumanUtopia enhances this further, creating a sense of community and warmth within the year group, with students now more able to consider the impact that they can have on others.



Lessons for Life Update

It has been a busy end to the academic year within our Lessons for Life curriculum at OBA this half term.

One of the key strands of our personal development curriculum is 'Relationships and Sex Education' which is statutory for all schools in the country to deliver. We have been extremely grateful the Halton 0-19 Healthy Child Service at Bridgewater Community Healthcare NHS Foundation Trust for their input with our Relationships and Sex Education delivery. OBA's school nurse Alison Langton and her colleagues have been visiting us for the last eight weeks to deliver a practical, professional and informative session to all of our year 9 students about contraception, sexually transmitted infections and healthy relationships. These lessons have raised awareness and offered advice to our students in a very informative manner.

Another key focus of our Lessons for Life programme is Careers Education. We are thrilled that our year

10 students have been able to embrace their work experience placements for the first time in three years. Students spent time in Lessons for Life preparing for their placements and subsequently reflecting on these placements as part of their project named 'Enhancing Employability'.

Students in year 7 have been following an innovative project named 'We Will Cook" which is an initiative running across all Ormiston Academies to raise awareness of food choices, food waste and food poverty as well healthy nutrition and diet.

In year 8 our students have been learning about equality and have completed a project entitled 'Understanding and respecting protected characteristics'. There are nine different protected characteristics which are part of The Equality Act 2010, as summarised below.
