Rome cityscape brings learning to life for

OBA Sixth Form students recently visited Rome for an immersive 4-day expedition, rich in culture and classical heritage.

The 25 students who are currently studying a mixture of History, Philosophy, Geography and Sociology courses at the academy's sixth form, had the chance to see their learning in action as they explored the eternal city and its world-famous landmarks.

On day 1, the group, accompanied by 3 members of OBA staff, visited the Catacombs of St. Calixtus, and enjoyed a walking tour in the sunshine to the Basilica de Santa Maria Maggiore and Spanish Steps. Day 2 involved an early start with another busy day of sightseeing ahead. The legendary and monumental Colosseum was the group's first stop, followed by the Roman Forum, Vittorio Emmanuel II monument and the beautiful 18th Century Trevi fountain.

On day 3 students visited Vatican City and climbed an impressive 551 steps to the cupola at the top of the imposing St. Peter's Basilica! This was a particular highlight for the group who were blown away by the sheer scale and grandeur of the largest church in the world!

Trip Leader, Mr McGlory, Head of Humanities, said "As the heart of one of the largest religious denominations, it was the ideal opportunity for students to experience this belief system

whilst also having the chance to appreciate a cosmopolitan cityscape with such a blend of ancient and modern."

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When taking a break from architecture, students and staff enjoyed immersing themselves in Rome's other famous heritage, sampling a great deal of authentic pizza, pasta, and ice cream!

Mr McGlory further commented, "It is one of the best trips I have been on as a teacher. The

students were exceptional, the sites and exhibits spectacular and we have already started planning the trip for next year - with some students already asking to come for a second time. That just shows how good of a trip it was!".

This has involved a mixture of visits from external agencies and classroom lessons and culminated with an 'options roadshow' information event where all courses on offer were represented and students could find out more about the courses they were interested in. The 'TRAP' story was co-developed with young people and parents/ carers across both Merseyside and Cheshire. The narrative, themes and issues covered and have recently moved on to learn about equality including the protected characteristics and racism in society. In Year 11 students have been working hard on their employability and have been completing a project named 'Preparing for Employment'. This project has seen students complete CVs, covering letters and application forms, learn about how to succeed in a job interview and also learn about their rights and responsibilities at work.

"Five of us Year 10 GCSE drama students recently got to attend a series of workshops conducted by people who have been in the industry and studied or are studying at drama school. We took part in three workshops; first a voice workshop where we learnt breathing techniques for longer and more effective speech. We then took part in an acting workshop. This is where we were shown a series of images in which we were asked to select one we felt connected to; once everybody had one, we were asked to gather as much detail as possible from the one image, to create a story and a character ready to perform. The final workshop we took part in was a movement workshop. This was my personal favourite as it was all about connecting with the people around you and communicating effectively. We played a series of games in which we had to listen to each other to complete. At the end of the day, we got to attend a Q&A with all the staff who were on the workshops with us, and we got lots of helpful information to take away - overall it was a great day."


Mr Tallant, Head of Music said, "They were a credit to the school, and we are very proud of how well they performed. As a young audience they were very entertained."






Our popular WOW days have continued this term with Year 4 and 5 children coming into the academy to do English, Geography, Science and Maths.
